Summary of the Lake Shawnee Club Board Meetings September 10, 2021

JCP&L has been contacted to replace parking lot lights at 1st and 2nd beaches for a minimal monthly fee.

A box was installed recently at 2nd Beach to address the issues with the internet on the west side of the lake.

The Social Committee had a great summer with lots of activities and a great turnout at all the events including a new Rock Around the Block event. Unfortunately, the Superhero 3-6-9 race was cancelled due to lack of registered participants; they plan to reschedule in March. The Fall rundown of activities include Texas Hold 'em, Annual Dog Walk, Trunk or Treat, Beer Tasting, Bear Outreach Program, and Trivia Night.

There was a brief discussion on changing the format of the LSNews to monthly during the summer to help inform the membership of the many activities. It was decided to do a monthly newsletter in May, June, July and August; every other month format will be followed the remainder of the year.

The Lake was treated in August for 5 acres of filamentous algae was targeted with a material utilizing chelated copper rather than copper sulfate. It is the safest and strongest treatment available although it is more expensive. The treatment was very effective removing over 80% of the algae. There was very little tape grass in the lake this year, which ended up saving us some money. However, the recent treatment of the tape grass did kill a few lilies at North End. There are currently 11 geese on the Lake; the egg addling program which utilized an air boat was extremely effective. Finally, it was reported that the sluice gate was opened during two recent storms to prevent any issues; the alternate spillway was very effective, as well.

Fall Workday is scheduled for Saturday, Nov 6th.

Summer Night Security was once again very uneventful.

It was noted that Ms. Kristin Iaconetti did a great job as Lifeguard supervisor despite a small staff with a new generation of guards this season. Mr. Matt Matriciano did a great job as Summer Security will very few issues.

The Club recently received their final CO Approval from the Township for the Clubhouse.

It was reported that a window was broken recently at Stanlick and the port a john at 1st Beach was flipped. The suspect was caught on camera, and the police are currently looking for the suspect.

Plans at 2nd Beach - to cut out, dig up and remove the old basketball hoops, and to construct and install new hoops, inspect trees and trim or remove if needed at all properties.

It was noted that a tree that fell into the lake was removed. A 40-foot log fell during a recent storm and was sticking out beyond the steps at 3rd Beach. A member moved and secured it a residence; it will need to be moved and cut up on Workday.

It was reported that the Snack Shack profited \$317.54 this season.

The Board discussed and approved a letter of credit from PNC Bank for \$25,000 as an insurance policy for the Club for any expenses that may not have been budgeted for specifically with the completion of the Clubhouse renovation.

The Board discussed the issue of members parking on areas that are Club property. The Club will address the issue with the members but may need to pursue a legal agreement to cover any liability.

October 1, 2021

Social Committee has a busy fall planned. They recently held their annual Dog Walk and Pet Parade with 9 dogs and a bunny in attendance; \$140 was raised and donated to the township animal shelter and dog park. Upcoming events include Halloween story time, Trunk or Treat, beer tasting, Bear awareness, Trivia Night, and Texas hold 'em.

It was reported that the last survey of the season was at the end of September, and everything looked great. It was a great season with weeds and the lake. All the treatments in June including 5 acres of filamentous were included in the contract. August looked great despite minimal treatments, including a treatment for filamentous and small amount of milfoil which was already budgeted. Half of the money in the budget was allocated for tape grass, which was nonexistent this year, so we came out ahead. Next year, they plan to trim down the lily pads, but not too much. There was no trouble with boats this year, and we want to keep an adequate amount for the fisherman. They are easy to treat but it must be perfect conditions.

Akers Landscaping will be contacted to remove the leaves again this year after Workday on Nov. 6th; leaves should be place in one big pile on each property. Boats that have been abandoned at the Clubhouse will be placed on Facebook Marketplace. If unable to remove them, a dumpster will be ordered.

Swim Team held their monthly meeting on September 14th and elected a new board for the upcoming year.

The women's bathrooms inside the Clubhouse continue to be an issue - the power flush inside bladders need to be replaced or new toilets need to be ordered. The piping in men's room will also be enclosed.

The upper stairs at 2nd Beach are missing a bullnose paver and will need to be replaced.

The Snack Shack is almost cleared out for the season. The tile on the serving window ledge will need to be repaired.

Weed Treatment and Geese Control Overview

I am happy to say after 37 years of overseeing our geese and weed program, this year was one of our most successful. Our geese population was minimal and our expense for weed treatment was way under budget. This was very good news because if we all can remember last year, we had a tremendous outbreak of tape grass (about 20 acres) in late July and August. This was an expense we did not expect. So, this year we put extra money in our weed budget to deal with this, but it never happened. We got residual control from our treatment last year. I know this make our Treasurer very happy. Let's look at both.

First, we had 11 adult geese on this lake all summer long. We addled (shook) 9 eggs in two different nests which eliminated 9 new adults on our lake. That's eliminating 9 lifetime residents (once imprinting takes place), so we got very lucky in finding those nests. Some of you may not agree with this process but Canadian Geese eat and poop a lot. They make a mess of our beaches and grounds and the rain takes their feces into the lake which can give us high bacteria counts. In the past, we have had to close beaches because of high bacteria numbers directly related to geese. They are a protected bird, so our only control sanctioned by the state (Fish, Game, and Wildlife) is to addle their eggs. Our town gets the permits and allows us to do this. If we just remove the eggs, the geese will just lay again.

Weed control this year was a pleasant surprise. We start surveying in early April as the lake is just waking up from a very cold and snowy winter. Before every survey, our biologist from Solitude does the chemistry which consists of temperature, turbidity (clarity) DO (dissolved oxygen) and PH. The biologist generally comes every two to three weeks unless I call with a problem and then he responds within a few days. In mid-June, we started seeing some traces of Milfoil in the northern end of the lake. Eurasian Milfoil can get out of hand very quickly, so we treated with an herbicide called Komene (about 3 acres) and it took care of it completely. (We are sorry that it burned a few lilies, but they will be back next year.) FYI — the herbicides we use in the lake are perfectly safe and within 24 - 48 hours they are diluted to 50% and we post signs to protect domestic animals. The good news is the herbicide was covered in our contract, so it didn't cost us a dime. July was uneventful with clear water, high DO numbers and neutral PH. In August as waters warmed up, filamentous Algae started to show up in the coves on the western shoreline. Algae loves still water as in the coves because it is not attached and has an opportunity to grow. By the 2nd week in August, we were ready to treat but could not because of Low DO. (Explained in another article about dead water from rain) This went on for about two weeks until the DO improved. We then treated 5 acres for filamentous. Our last survey came in mid-September, and everything looks great.

In summary, we got very lucky this summer. As you might know, I am on my paddle board almost every day keeping a check on weed growth and looking for geese nests. Because of the depth of this beautiful lake, we must be vigilant to keep everything in check and take care of problems right away. We are very lucky to have a Board of Governors that supports this approach and recognizes the health and beauty of this lake as a top priority for our community. 

Our first Thanksgiving:



The miracle of the first Thanksgiving was a Patuxet Indian known as Squanto. What are the odds that Pilgrims arriving from the old world, would encounter a native American who spoke English?

Had it not been for the added ease of communication between the settlers and the Indians, that first Thanksgiving might have been a completely different story.

Squanto, or Tisquantum, was captured around 1605 by Captain George Weymouth and taken to England with four others. Over time, Squanto learned English and during the course of his life, he traveled across the Atlantic at least six times.

Many, though not all, historians believe that Squanto's efforts in helping the Pilgrims recover from the harsh first winter during which they lost half of their original number was the primary reason for their survival. Squanto taught the Pilgrims the native method of cultivating maize by using local fish to fertilize crops.

Under the leadership of William Bradford, and thanks to Squanto's ability to interpret in English, the Plymouth colony suffered less hardships than their brethren in Virginia.

With an abundant harvest in 1621, the tiny band of Pilgrims were joined by 90 Indians in an English tradition known as the Harvest Festival.

The first Thanksgiving celebration lasted three days with the participants dining on venison, goose, duck, turkey, fish and, naturally, cornbread.

Ice Safety

Outdoor ice sports and activities can be safe and enjoyable, but there is no such thing as 100 percent safe ice. Anyone who spends time near the ice should first determine the ice conditions, and then take precautions to stay safe.

Preventing Ice Accidents

- Follow these guidelines to avoid accidents when on or near ice:
- Check the ice thickness before going out. To be safe, ice should be solid and at least 4 inches thick. Remember, the ice may not be the same thickness over the entire area of a lake or pond. Test ice thickness by using a chisel, cordless drill or ice auger.
- Be safe—the more people on the ice, the thicker it should be.
- Use ice on smaller, shallower and slower-moving bodies of water for ice activities, it is usually more solid.
- Look for objects sticking up through the ice and mark them as hazards.
- Do not go out on ice that has recently frozen, thawed and then frozen again. This happens in the spring and early winter as temperatures change often. Wait until the outside temperature has been below freezing long enough that at least 4 inches of solid ice forms over the entire area.
- Always stay with at least one other person.

LAKE SHAWNEE ICE FISHING RULES

- No use of gas-powered augers before 8 AM
- No fishing closer than 50 feet from the shore of anyone's property unless it is your own
- No fishing closer than 100 feet from the Beach areas and directly behind the Clubhouse
- Drill no more than ten holes per person per day
- Return all fish to the Lake alive that you do not intend to eat or otherwise take with you
- When leaving, take everything off the ice with you, including fish, garbage, coals, firewood, cans, etc.
- No glass bottles allowed on the ice at any time
- No fires allowed on the ice other than cooking on a grill
- Member or guest badges must be worn while on the ice

These rules must be followed in order for all of us to continue enjoying our ice fishing on Lake Shawnee!
